Role Description

Vice President - Wellbeing and Community

Minimum Commitment

Full time - 37.5 hrs per week with some evening and weekend commitments.

Remuneration

£18,500 per annum

Who can stand for this role?

All postgraduate students studying at the University of York may stand.

What does the job entail?

The role is integral to the GSA and Principal Officers will represent York's postgraduate students to the University and external stakeholders, ensuring the needs and views of Postgraduates are considered in relevant decisions.

You will be responsible for ensuring the wellbeing of students is taken into consideration by the University when making decisions and ensure the University are aware of developing trends in the postgraduate community. You will be responsible for planning and running wellbeing campaigns.

To ensure that our members get the most from their University of York experience, You will have responsibility for designing and developing a social activities program encompassing events, trips and sports and ensuring that the offering is a true reflection of the needs and wishes of the membership as well as monitoring and measuring the social program the GSA provides.

This role covers the raising of profile and development of the Postgraduate Community both within the University, in the City and further afield, where required. You will also support the Postgraduate networks and the network coordinators.

You will also be a Trustee of the Association and have significant, and shared, budgetary responsibility.

Place of Work: The Graduate Students' Association, The University of York, Heslington, York, YO10 5NG. The post may require some minimal travel within the UK.

Benefits

26 Days per year (pro-rata) holiday

Duration of Post

1 year post, with possibility of extension for a 2nd year on election

Responsible for: Events Officer, Sports Officer, Communities Officer, Volunteering Officer, Colleges Officer, Equality Officer

Specific Duties:

- To represent the views, needs and interests of postgraduate students at university and GSA committees
- To develop, run and evaluate a social program for the membership of the GSA, including events, trips and sports
- To be an active member of the GSA Council and other relevant GSA structures
- To support the GSA Council with their activities
- To research, formulate, write and propose policy or strategy, where required
- Provide feedback from postgraduate students for key stakeholders in the university, the local and national community
- Coordinate and provide advice and support to the PG network volunteers
- Coordinate and administer the postgraduate community fund.
- To support the GSA President in coming to decisions and representing the membership, including acting on behalf of the President upon request
- To raise awareness of issues faced by postgraduate students and promote ways to address these
- To run relevant wellbeing campaigns around issues facing postgraduate students
- To act as a signatory on the GSA bank account and manage relative budgets in agreement with the CEO and GSA President
- To act as a responsible trustee and director to the organisation

This list is not exhaustive.

General Duties:

- To provide high levels of representation to all postgraduate students
- To provide a high level of constituent care, including being non-judgmental and open-minded approach to representation and support and being considerate of the views of others at all times
- To provide timely updates and feedback to all stakeholders, including members, fellow Officers, the GSA Staff and University staff as required
- To signpost stakeholders to relevant services and provisions
- To act at all times as an ambassador for the postgraduate student body and for the GSA
- To actively uphold the principals of the GSA's Officers' Code of Conduct
- To take an active role in the GSA's campaigns, activities and research
- To actively engage in the compiling of GSA led reports
- To work in partnership with GSA Staff.
- To proactively engage in raising awareness of postgraduate issues by talking to students
- To support with the running of GSA led campaigns and events
- To attend university and other stakeholder events as an ambassador of the GSA
- To ensure proper preparation is made to represent students at university committees

This list is not exhaustive.

Trustee Duties:

1. To ensure the GSA complies with and fulfils its legal obligations.
2. To contribute to the development and implementation of the GSA's strategic vision.
3. To engage in collective decision making regarding resources and finances of the GSA, ensuring financial stability.
4. To ensure that staff of the GSA are well supported and supervised so that they may do their job efficiently and effectively.
5. To ensure that all decisions taken are in the interest of postgraduate students and will not harm the image or reputation of the GSA.

The Life of a Full Time Officer

Whichever role you have chosen to stand for, you are putting yourself forward for a unique job that carries responsibilities and opportunities quite unlike those you would normally associate with a graduate job or a sabbatical year.

The Role

The Officer Team consists of the President and Vice President, who are each responsible for teams of volunteer students. Each have their own jobs to do but must also spend a lot of time working together as a team. Like any job, there are minimum requirements – with occasional evenings and weekends, and as you will be an ambassador for the GSA there will be times you need to dress smartly and ensure you behave appropriately.

As Trustees, the Officer Team are responsible for setting the direction of the GSA for the year they are in charge, and making day-to-day decisions about how the GSA is run. If successfully elected to one of these roles you will have a budget to control and campaigns which you are responsible for. There can be lots of meetings to attend and reports to write, but don't be put off by this – they are necessary formalities needed to put your ideas into action, and more than balanced out by the time you will spend talking to postgraduates.

The Lifestyle

As well as the day to day work, there will be a range of conferences, seminars and training events aimed at giving you more knowledge, confidence and insight towards achieving your goals – so you can expect to be doing some travelling around the country from time to time visiting other institutions and building a network of contacts. The social life of an Principal Officer can also be whatever you want to make of it – at the very least you will get to attend a number of high-profile award ceremonies.

Relationships

Your diary will have a significant number of discussions (some formal, some less so) with University managers, GSA staff, external organisations, and of course – students. You may have to demonstrate your ability to maintain calm in the face of disagreement from time to time, so staying focused on the best interests of our membership as well as being able to politely disagree with others will ensure that the GSA will remain influential and not left outside the numerous decisions that impact on our members every year.

You will also need to maintain relationships with various student groups including student societies. As a leader of the organisation, and to avoid any accusation of bias or conflict, it is strongly recommended that you don't sit on the committee of any student society whilst you are a student officer. This also helps to ensure that your focus remains on your officer role and to avoid accusations of favouritism or conflict of interest.

Staff support

You will have at your disposal a team of dedicated staff, employed to perform specific duties within the GSA, and to offer their knowledge and expertise to help you achieve your goals.

Team Work

You will need to work as part of a close knit team of staff and students. A big part of this will be about learning to get your point across and debate topics without taking things personally. The postgraduate community is a diverse mix with many different opinions and you will need to be able to reflect this in your role.

Being the figurehead

Having your picture as part of any number of posters, handbooks news articles, web posts will be second nature by the time Welcome Week comes around. Officers will get used to total strangers approaching and saying anything from "you're that person in the GSA...I think..." to "What are you going to do about..?" Be prepared to say "I don't know, tell me more about that?" to even occasionally "thanks, it's great to hear that you enjoyed the event..." Being in the spotlight might take some getting used to, but there will be a number of you all in the same situation with whom you can relate.

Representing the needs of 4500+ students

There will be a number of times when people will ask you, "and what do postgraduates think about this?" Clearly the variety of postgraduates at the University of York is remarkable, whether considering faith or ethnicity through to the mode of study chosen by students here. What this adds up to is one thing – student interests and opinion is not a simple matter and often there are specific groups of students with specific needs that shouldn't be forgotten. This is an advantage when dealing with those who expect the simple answer; we can be seen as far more influential when we have knowledge of extra options or needs.

How to Write a Manifesto

Writing an election manifesto needn't be something to tear your hair out about. Essentially, your manifesto should state what you would plan to do in your time in office and what changes you would make. It is not an excuse to bad mouth your opposition, or make unrealistic promises. Take some time before you write to think about what you believe you can achieve and what the voters would respond to.

Some top tips for writing your manifesto:

- Find out more about the GSA and the role by coming into the office and talking to the CEO and current officers
- Be concise and use clear language. Avoid long, complicated words – you won't win awards for being clever and you might just alienate important voters.
- Make sure you have clearly stated what position you are running for and where students can go to vote (www.yorkgsa.org/elections).
- Set out your goals for your time in office and ensure they are realistic & achievable – officers are answerable to the student body who might decide to ask why you've not managed to rebuild the GSA building. Work out what would make you vote for someone and think about which points would appeal most to students.
- Your manifesto is about you and not about your opponents. Avoid discrediting or disrespecting others and making reference to members of staff is a big no-no!
- Be relevant. There's not much point telling everyone you like cute pussy cats when you're standing for President. However, instances where you have shown leadership, tenacity, and tact would indicate to voters your suitability for the role.
- You have a maximum of 1000 characters so keep it concise. Voters will want to read what you have to say and are likely to give up if you have written the equivalent of the Oxford English Dictionary.
- Be creative and inspiring.
